School-Community Collaboration

There is new interest in designing programs to reduce teen pregnancy, enhance outcomes for babies and children, and engage young fathers who are involved in unplanned pregnancies. A National Responsible Fatherhood Clearinghouse brief authored by Child Trends, *Promising Teen Fatherhood Programs: Initial Evidence Lessons from Evidence-Based Research*, identifies ten common features of "model" and "promising" programs for teen fathers.
