Defining "Systemic Approach"

Dropout prevention is understood and "owned" by everyone in the system.

Dropout prevention is the focus and responsibility of everyone in the system.

Dropout prevention is strategically planned, evaluated, monitored and periodically modified.

Policies, practices, rules, and guiding documents consider and address dropout prevention.

Improved graduation outcomes are the primary focus of all work.

A systemic approach results in educator creativity and multiple other acts of dropout prevention.

Basic Foundational Strategies



School– Community Collaboration

Defining "School-Community Collaboration"

Dropout prevention is understood and "owned" by community leaders and thought shapers.

Community leaders and organizations are committed to engage with and support the school's efforts to improve graduation outcomes.

The faith community is engaged in dropout prevention and supports the school's efforts to improve student outcomes and graduation rates.

Businesses understand the economic impact of higher graduation rates and are willing to financially support the school's efforts and to communicate the importance of school success to student and parent employees.

Political figures and elected officials understand dropout prevention and are committed to support the school's work to improve graduation outcomes.



School-community collaboration around dropout prevention motivates educators, parents, and students. It also maintains focus on dropout prevention over time.

Systemic Approach

School– Community Collaboration Safe Learning Environment



Defining "Safe Learning Environment"

Students feel physically safe and secure at school, with their peers, and with adult educators.

Students enjoy and look forward to their classes, to being with their teachers, and to outside-class school experiences.

Students feel free from embarrassment, humiliation, or stress in the school environment.

School is "a place where students want to be".



A safe learning environment solves many other dropout-related problems such as truancy, discipline problems, and student disengagement.









Interaction of Foundation Strategies with Other Strategies


Without the Foundational Strategies, other dropout prevention strategies, programs, and interventions don't produce maximum results.





